Block One

Equity and Inclusion

As unionists, our power comes from our numbers, and everyone deserves a seat at the table. With that in mind, this workshop focuses on building a bigger table; how to implement more equitable structures in your local.

Organizing Plans

Planning is a key component of any local union's success. With focus and direction, we are more likely to achieve success. Plans allow us to determine our collective goals and benchmarks for success while also establishing clarity on the strategies, tactics and resources we will need to achieve those goals. Learn the elements of a successful organizing plan, how to get started on making an organizing plan, and best practices to develop an organizing plan.

Open Bargaining

Open bargaining, the practice of allowing and encouraging all employees to attend negotiations sessions, is a strategy that is increasingly being used by locals across the state. In this session, we will discuss the merits of open bargaining, how to effectively use open bargaining to increase member engagement in the negotiations process, and how open bargaining can increase our leverage and power to achieve contracts that meet our needs and demands.

Block Two

Workshop: Stopping Sexual Harassment in the Workplace

Sexual harassment is real; it occurs in our workplaces and it greatly impacts our lives and the lives of our coworkers. We also discuss real-world scenarios and work together to identify direct actions you and your union can take to change your workplace culture.

Organizing to Resolve Issues

As leaders, activists, and members of our local unions, it is common for members to approach us with issues and concerns in our workplaces. Often we look to the grievance process in our union contract as the first, and maybe only, means to try to resolve these issues. In this training, we'll explore how to identify issues in the workplace, how to assess when the grievance process or organized collective action (or both) is the best path towards resolving issues, and the key steps in organizing members to resolve issues.

Block Three

Work/Life Balancing

Working people balance living rich personal lives alongside waged production workloads in a capitalist society. For union activists, we are signing up for even more tasks which can simultaneously fight back against excessive workloads but also add to our feelings of exhaustion. In this workshop, we'll have a roundtable unpacking of: burnout, what it is, and how it shows up in our spaces; the differences between avoidance and rest; and brainstorm practices towards mutuality, connectivity, belonging, and co-operation in our activist efforts.

Organizing Stewards and Leaders (Worksite Structures)
