SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

Provisions for submitting resolutions to the 2019 AFT-Oregon Convention are contained in Article IV, Section 1 of the Bylaws of the AFT-Oregon Constitution:

Section 1. Resolutions to the Convention may be introduced by locals or the Executive Council of AFT-Oregon in this manner:

- a. A resolution must be mailed or e-mailed to the AFT-Oregon Office postmarked or date stamped no later than thirty (30) calendar days prior to the opening of the Convention if it is to be considered;
- b. It shall contain the title and shall be submitted to the AFT-Oregon President as a text based document and a pdf. The resolution shall bear the signature of at least two elected officers of the local submitting the resolution;
- c. The officers signing the resolution shall certify that the resolution was approved for submission to the Convention by the local executive board or membership, or by the Executive Council of AFT-Oregon.

The following resolutions were postmarked according to the above provisions.

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NOTE: Substitutions for these committee chairs may be made if, for any reason, the appointees are unable to serve.

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COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

Resolution #2019 -1

- 1 Promoting Protections for International Workers
- 2 Whereas, international workers make up a significant percentage of the workforce in Oregon; and
- 3 Whereas, the material conditions and lived experiences of international workers are substantially
- 4 different from domestic workers, including visa and work restrictions, fear of reprisal, and
- 5 discrimination; and
- 6 Whereas, international workers require and deserve protection and support from their organizations
- 7 and the state regardless of documentation status; now
- 8 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-OR acknowledge, promote and build awareness of the multiple
- 9 struggles international workers face in their work environments; and
- 10 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-OR promote bargaining platforms that address international workers'
- concerns and challenges separately and protect them; now
- 12 **Be It Finally Resolved** that AFT-OR will submit this resolution to the national level.

COLLECTIVE BARGAINING

Resolution #2019 -2

- 1 Bargaining for Disability Accommodation and Access
- 2 Whereas, individuals with physical or psychological disabilities or those with chronic health issues face
- 3 unique challenges in accessing and working in the traditional professional environment; and
- 4 Whereas, disabled individuals' requests for basic accessibility accommodations are both necessary and
- 5 protected by the Americans with Disabilities Act; and
- 6 Whereas, these accommodations come at the recommendation of medical and psychological care
- 7 professionals; now
- 8 Therefore Be it Resolved, that AFT-OR will lend support towards bargaining for disability access
- 9 necessities and protections and for healthcare that covers chronic disability conditions; and
- 10 Be it Further Resolved, that AFT-OR will endeavor to combat the marginalization of the disabled
- community by supporting the visibility and voices of the disabled community; now
- 12 Be It Finally Resolved, that AFT-OR will recommend AFT National include disability access and support
- as a stable necessity for member unions across the country.

Resolution #2019 -3

- 1 Resolution to Expand Optional Retirement Plan (ORP)
- Whereas, the current eligibility for public workers to qualify for the Public Employees Retirement
- 3 System (PERS) specifically excludes Oregon public university graduate employees; and
- 4 Whereas, the eligibility for PERS also excludes post-doctoral scholars; and

- 6 Whereas, the state of Oregon has expanded access to the Optional Retirement Plan (ORP) for post-
- 7 doctoral scholars who work in Oregon public universities; and
- 8 Whereas, the requirement for post-doctoral scholars is to contribute between 2%-4% to qualify for ORP;
- 9 and
- 10 Whereas, a post-doctoral scholar's contribution to ORP will be matched by their respective public
- 11 employer,
- 12 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-OR will advocate for the expansion of the ORP to include public
- university graduate employees in Oregon; and
- 14 Be It Finally Resolved, that the AFT-OR Executive Council will encourage the AFT National to adopt for a
- 15 similar expansion in public retirement eligibility for graduate employees at the federal level.

Resolution #2019 -4

- 1 Endorsing the Oregon Green New Deal
- 2 Whereas, the ongoing and ever-worsening climate catastrophe mandates an urgent response; and
- 3 Whereas, the labor movement is in a unique position to promote effective change quickly, and
- 4 Whereas, the labor movement in Oregon should serve as an example for this kind of change, as Oregon
- 5 is already at the vanguard of the fight for the climate; and
- 6 Whereas, AFT-OR and National should lead other cousin unions in the AFL-CIO by example through the
- 7 endorsement of real solutions for the ongoing climate crisis; and
- 8 Whereas, The Oregon Green New Deal, which has been endorsed by six elected officials and seven
- 9 organizations, exists as a promise to future generations; and
- 10 Whereas, The Oregon Green New Deal lays out seven real steps for change, including (1) phasing out
- fossil fuel infrastructure, (2) strong regulations for healthy, breathable air, (3) clean, community-
- 12 controlled 100% renewable energy, (4) regenerative, sustainable farms and forests, (5) transportation
- 13 justice, (6) protection of communities already experiencing a change in climate, and (7) funding the Just
- 14 Transition¹; now
- 15 Therefore Be It Resolved, AFT-OR immediately endorse the Oregon Green New Deal, adding its name to
- 16 seven other organizations; and
- 17 **Be It Further Resolved,** AFT-OR bring this Green New Deal to the national level as a priority for the
- immediate future of the planet; now
- 19 Be It Finally Resolved; AFT-OR and National work within the larger labor movement to make the tenets
- of the Oregon Green New Deal a priority for the labor movement as a whole.

Resolution #2019 -5

1 Resolution to Endorse Policies Within the Green New	Deal
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- Whereas, the Green New Deal is a policy proposal for systematically addressing the societal harms
- 3 caused by climate change and carbon emissions; and
- 4 Whereas, the proposals for addressing carbon emissions and climate change seek a harmony between
- 5 the economic, social, political, and ecological; and
- 6 Whereas, the Green New Deal explicitly calls for protections of jobs, a just transition for those employed
- 7 in carbon-intensive industries, a guaranteed living wage for all residents of the United States, and other
- 8 such provisions which are the bedrock of organized labor's principled goals for economic justice; and
- 9 Whereas, the Green New Deal calls for addressing inequities first amongst communities of color, poor
- 10 people, and other oppressed populations on the basis of identity and class; and
- 11 Whereas, the Green New Deal calls for free universal health care, which is a position already adopted by
- 12 American Federation of Teachers both nationally and at the state federation level; and
- 13 Whereas, the American Federation of Teachers National and Oregon federation are strategically placed
- 14 to influence adoption of such policies through political endorsements,
- 15 Now Therefore Be It Resolved, that the American Federation of Teachers Oregon federation will not
- 16 endorse any candidate for political office that does not explicitly pledge their advocacy for free universal
- 17 health care, a guaranteed living wage, a just transition for workers employed in carbon-intensive
- 18 industries, and a commitment to the core positions addressing climate change within the Green New
- 19 Deal; and
- 20 **Be It Further Resolved,** that this resolution will be made a priority for advocating adoption at the
- 21 American Federation of Teachers National Convention at the scale of our national union; and
- 22 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-OR will use all available influence to encourage American Federation of
- 23 Teachers National to not endorse any political candidate who does not pledge to advocate for these
- policies should this resolution not pass at the AFT National Convention.
- 25 **Be It Finally Resolved**, that AFT-OR will convene a committee of rank-and-file members to create a
- 26 policy platform simultaneously addressing climate change and economic justice to be submitted to all
- 27 state political officials for adoption.

2	Whereas, the AFT-Oregon encourages and supports the efforts of all workers to join or form unions in order to bargain the terms and conditions of their employment; and
4 5	Whereas, improving the lives of working people in Oregon depends largely on the power of campaign workers to help elect pro-union candidates and pass pro-union policies; and
6 7	Whereas, Oregon campaign workers work long hours for little pay that often results in less than minimum wage compensation; and
8 9	Whereas, Oregon campaign workers do not have access to healthcare, untaxed healthcare stipends or paid sick days; and
10 11	Whereas, Oregon campaign workers have no access to grievance procedures when they experience issues like sexual harassment on the job; and
12 13	Whereas, Oregon campaign workers are currently "at will" employees, hired and fired at the whim of management, with no protection against unjust firings or disciplinary actions; and
14 15	Whereas, Oregon campaign workers are often expected to work seven days a week, with no agreed upon time off, causing burnout and unhealthy workers; and
16 17	Whereas, the Campaign Workers Guild has negotiated thirty contracts across the country in its first election cycle as a union, including three statewide Democratic parties; and
18 19 20	Whereas, while Oregon leads the way on many workers rights issues, our campaign workers are currently being left behind; and
21 22 23	Now Therefore be it Resolved that , consistent with our party platform, the AFT-Oregon strongly supports the efforts of the Campaign Workers Guild to organize Oregon campaign workers. Additionally, we demand that all candidates immediately recognize the CWG upon a majority

- 1 Addressing Sexual Violence and Harassment in the Workplace
- Whereas, AFT-OR has an ongoing commitment to combat sexual violence; and
- 3 Whereas, AFT-OR does not tolerate any form of sexual harassment, and will treat all incidents and
- 4 allegations seriously and promptly with trauma-based responses; and
- 5 Whereas, members of this union and other workers continue to experience sexual violence and
- 6 harassment in their workplaces; and
- 7 Whereas, workers have the right to safe and respectful working conditions, including choosing to
- 8 disclose an experience of sexual violence without fear of retribution; and
- 9 Whereas, locals of this union are already working to provide protections for workers experiencing sexual
- 10 violence; and
- 11 Whereas, AFT-OR is in a unique position to gather the practices, policies, and bargaining language from
- these locals and provide it to everyone; now
- 13 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-OR address the frequency and severity of these occurrences in
- 14 consultation with locals; and
- 15 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-OR promote zero-tolerance against sexual discrimination, harassment
- 16 and violence and will compile a list of best practices to be distributed to all locals; and
- 17 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-OR promote bargaining platforms that uphold the rights of the
- 18 complainants and survivors and validate their experiences as potential hindrances to their ability to
- 19 work; now
- 20 **Be It Finally Resolved** that AFT-OR will submit this resolution to the national level.

- 1 Support for Transgender Workers
- 2 Whereas, AFT-OR has a continued commitment to supporting transgender workers throughout Oregon;
- 3 and
- 4 Whereas, at the 2018 AFT-OR convention a resolution was passed committing AFT-OR to defend
- 5 transgender workers' access to healthcare; and
- 6 Whereas, non-binary and gender-nonconforming workers are included under this umbrella, but often
- 7 face particular constraints in the workplace which require specific responses from AFT-OR and locals;
- 8 and
- 9 Whereas, current national politics continue to target trans people; and
- 10 Whereas, our trans members need continued support; now
- 11 Therefore Be It Resolved that AFT-OR will compile a list of best practices implemented by locals in
- 12 defense of transgender, non-binary, and gender non-conforming workers; and
- 13 Be It Further Resolved that AFT-OR will compile a list of already-existing statewide protections for
- transgender, non-binary, and gender non-conforming people including protections in the workplace,
- 15 housing, and everyday life; and
- 16 **Be It Further Resolved** that AFT-OR will make these best practices available to locals to help guide and
- 17 direct agitation for the rights of trans workers; now
- 18 **Be It Finally Resolved** that AFT-OR will bring this to national.

Resolution #2019 -9

- 1 Recognition of Native Sovereignty in Schools
- Whereas, the United Nations Declaration on the rights of Indigenous Peoples affirms that indigenous
- 3 peoples are equal to all other peoples; and
- 4 Whereas, there is an urgent need to respect and promote the inherent rights of Indigenous Peoples,
- 5 especially in regard to their lands, territories, and resources; and
- 6 Whereas, the rights affirmed in treaties, agreements, and other constructive arrangements between
- 7 states and Indigenous Peoples are not only of domestic, but in some instances, of international concern;
- 8 and
- 9 Whereas, Indigenous Peoples have a right to the lands, territories, and resources which they have
- 10 traditionally inhabited; now
- 11 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-OR acknowledge the people's land upon which our educational
- institutions are built at the institutional, state, and federal levels; and
- 13 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-OR will work with Indigenous Peoples within Oregon and other states
- to develop programs that serve the needs of members in our classrooms by offering curriculum,
- teaching, and pedagogical support related to best practices for discussing the living history of Indigenous
- 16 Peoples; now
- 17 Be It Finally Resolved that AFT-OR will provide substantive education to all of their members on the
- 18 legal recognition and protection that U.S. tribal sovereignty and international law provide for these
- 19 peoples, [1] such as providing easy access to teaching guides, syllabi, and reading materials suitable for
- 20 teaching at the K12 and post-secondary level.

Resolution #2019 -10

- 1 Opposing The Use of Prison Labor in the Workplace
- Whereas, the Prison Industry Enhancement Certification Program (PIECP) was created by Congress in
- 3 1979 to, "encourage states and units of local government to establish employment opportunities for
- 4 inmates that approximate private-sector work opportunities;"[1] and
- Whereas, the PIECP does not offer sufficient protections to prison laborers and substantial changes
- 6 must be made to current state and federal legislation in order for prison labor to be less exploitative;
- 7 and
- 8 Whereas, it may not be possible for prison labor to be a non-exploitative endeavor; and
- 9 Whereas, the protections provided by the right to unionize are crucial to any laborer regardless of that
- 10 laborer's criminal status; and
- Whereas, prisoners, unlike non-prisoners, are not granted this right under the U.S. Constitution;^[2] now
- 12 Therefore Be It Resolved that AFT-OR will cease all activity that uses prison labor or its products; and
- 13 Be It Further Resolved that AFT-OR will encourage bargaining units to eliminate the purchase of goods
- made in whole or in part by prison labor in their workplaces and union offices; now
- 15 **Be It Finally Resolved** that AFT-OR will condemn the exploitation of prisoners for unjustly compensated
- or uncompensated labor.

- 1 Continuing to Oppose ICE in Schools
- Whereas, all AFT-OR members agree that schools should be a place where students feel safe; and
- 3 Whereas, immigrant and international students and workers, and their children, as well as students and
- 4 workers of color and from other marginalized groups, are under increased scrutiny in the current
- 5 political climate; and
- 6 Whereas, unions have a commitment to their members to represent and respect our inalienable human
- 7 rights; and
- 8 Whereas, increased scrutiny have led to attacks on our members' inalienable human rights and dignity;
- 9 and
- 10 Whereas, racism, xenophobia, and Islamophobia are implicitly and explicitly endorsed by ICE as a
- political instrument of the administration against students; and

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- 13 Whereas, in 2018 AFT-OR passed a resolution which opposed ICE officers being placed in schools; and
- 14 Whereas, in 2018 AFT-OR passed a resolution vowing to produce and distribute information about legal
- 15 rights and immigration law in their schools, and commit resources to retaining legal representation for
- 16 vulnerable students, teachers, families, and union members; and
- 17 Whereas, in 2018 AFT-OR passed a resolution vowing to take this issue to the national level; and
- 18 Whereas, this remains an issue of immediate concern for many of our members, now
- 19 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-OR shall conduct a review on the efficacy and implementation of the
- 20 2018 resolution at the local level; and
- 21 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-OR will conduct a review of how many of our local schools currently
- 22 cooperate with ICE officers, reminding those who do about the danger ICE poses to our students and
- 23 members; and
- 24 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-OR will update its information for the new year and redistribute to
- 25 locals; now

- 1 Advocating for Donations to Public Education Institutions to be In Part Donated to General Funds
- Whereas, public education has been defunded in Oregon and other states; and
- 3 Whereas, universities and other public education institutions are increasingly reliant on private
- 4 donations for operating costs; and
- 5 Whereas, private donations can be directed to specific, non-education centered projects like stadium
- 6 construction without contributing to the educational goals of the institution; and
- Whereas, the main cost of providing an education is the salaries of instructors and staff; and
- 8 Whereas, the main harm of budget cuts befalls employees providing essential services rather than
- 9 administrators and management; now
- 10 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-OR include public funding for public institutions in AFT-OR's lobbying
- 11 priorities; and
- 12 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-OR will recommend to locals, legislators, and other groups to advocate
- 13 for a certain percent of all donations being earmarked for general budgetary purposes; now
- 14 **Be It Finally Resolved** that AFT-OR will submit this resolution to the national level.

Resolution #2019 -13

- 1 Call to improve the benefit of unused sick leave
- Whereas, sick leave is a negotiated benefit that is part of the employees compensation package; and
- 3 Whereas, many employees end their employment with weeks' worth of unused sick leave; and
- 4 Whereas, employees under the Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan (OPSRP) lose their unused sick
- 5 leave when they retire while PERS Tier 1 and 2 receive a benefit for this time; and
- 6 Whereas, employees are incentivized to use their sick leave when they are not sick, often right before
- 7 resigning or retiring, so they don't lose out on this benefit; and
- 8 Whereas, misuse of the sick leave benefit is a common basis for disciplinary action; and
- 9 Whereas, employers rarely provide severance to non-executive staff and cashing out unused sick leave
- can help an employee pay for expenses while looking for a new job; and
- Whereas, providing a benefit for unused sick leave would encourage employees to only use their sick
- 12 leave when they are actually sick; and
- 13 Whereas, employers will still have the power to send an employee home if they report to work sick; and
- 14 Whereas, reducing the amount of sick leave abuse will reduce the use of substitutes which in turn will
- improve the learning environment for our students; now
- 16 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon support the passage of legislation that provides a benefit to
- 17 OPSRP retirees with unused sick leave; and
- 18 **Therefore Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon support the passage of legislation that requires
- 19 employers to provide some benefit to all employees with unused sick leave who resign or are
- 20 terminated; and
- 21 Therefore Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon advocates for employees to have the right to choose
- 22 how to receive their unused sick leave benefit; and
- 23 Be it Finally Resolved that AFT-Oregon drafts sample contract language for locals to include in contract
- 24 negotiations that provide a benefit to all employees for unused sick leave.

Resolution #2019 -14

- 1 Supporting driver's licenses for all
- 2 Whereas, current Oregon law requires proof of citizenship or legal residency to receive a driver's
- 3 license; and
- 4 Whereas, there is a significant population of students and parents who lack the documentation to
- 5 receive a driver's license; and
- 6 Whereas, many k-12 students depend on their parents for transportation to participate in school
- 7 activities; and
- 8 Whereas, without a driver's license, a person cannot purchase auto insurance which increases the rate
- 9 of uninsured accidents; and
- 10 Whereas, a driver's license has served as a defacto standard form of identification across the country;
- 11 and
- 12 Whereas, the Real ID Act of 2005 created additional compliance requirements for IDs that are accepted
- by federal agencies which is expected to raise the cost of compliant IDs; and
- 14 Whereas, creating two tiers of ID cards, one that complies with the Real ID Act and one that does not,
- 15 gives Oregonians a choice on if they wish to pay more for a Real ID Act compliant card; and
- 16 Whereas, allowing all adults to hold state issued identification cards will give businesses and
- organizations a way to confirm the identity of the adult; and
- Whereas, confirmation of one's identity is required to receive a wide range of goods and services; now
- 19 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon supports the passage of legislation that allows all who reside
- 20 in the state of Oregon to qualify to receive a driver's license; and
- 21 Therefore Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon joins in coalition with immigrant rights groups, like
- 22 CAUSA, to help pass this legislation; and
- 23 **Be it Finally Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon encourages other state affiliates to support this effort.

1	Resolution	for Expandi	ng Renters'	Protections
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- Whereas, through a week-to-week tenancy lease, landlords may terminate a rental agreement given a
- 3 10 day notice; and
- 4 Whereas, through a week-to-week tenancy lease, landlords may increase rent given a 7 day notice; and
- Whereas, through a week-to-week tenancy lease, landlords may increase rent without a cap; and
- 6 Whereas, all landlords are capped at seven percent rent increase plus the increase in Consumer Price
- 7 Index only after a 12 month tenancy period; and
- 8 Whereas, if a rental property is less than 15 years old or the landlord provides reduced rent as part of
- 9 federal, state, or local program, there is no limit to the increase in rent prices; and
- 10 Whereas, for ORS 90.396 and ORS 90.405 in which there are restrictions and/or evictions based on pet
- ownership, sex work and substance abuse,
- 12 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will lobby to lift the ban on all forms of rent control; and
- 13 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon will lobby for strict rent control that is less than the previous
- 14 seven percent increase in addition to the Consumer Price Index increase every 12 month period which
- includes properties built within 15 years; and
- 16 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon develops a working group to address the previous cooperative
- 17 housing resolution and how to firmly implement designated funding to AFT-OR locals; and
- 18 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon creates a report that details where the cooperatives are being
- 19 established, and the budget for each establishment; and
- 20 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon establish policy to protect sex workers and those struggling
- 21 with substance abuse from eviction within 24 hours; and
- 22 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon establish policy to enforce pet owner protection as seen in HB
- 23 2683; and
- 24 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon endorses any legislation which prohibits additional rent
- 25 charged for pet owners; and
- 26 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon endorses any legislation which prohibits the requirement of
- 27 medical documents for pet owners to rent; and

- 4 long-term plan for or location of financial reserves (in checking, savings, CDs, etc.); and
- Whereas, inflation is approximately 2% and thus money kept in checking or savings accounts is usually

- 7 Whereas, having a long-term financial plan that is available to members is responsible and encourages
- 8 similar plans on local levels; and
